We hope this guide will give prospective and/or future incoming students an overview of the most important items you need to know about the French higher education system, the different administrative departments you will have to be in contact with during your stay, and provide you with some useful information to assist you during your time in France.

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Teaching and Grading Methods

We operate the ECTS credit system. You will receive a transcript at the end of your stay showing the courses you have studied.

Lectures / Cours Magistraux (C.M.)

Lectures are taught by renowned academics that cover core concepts in Economics. Students are evaluated at the end of every semester.

For International Students, lectures account for 4 ECTS.

Tutorial classes / Travaux Dirigés

In the tutorials, students are divided into smaller working groups (20 to 30 students), and work on specific issues and projects. Attending tutorials is mandatory once you sign up. Teaching assistants check the students' attendance.

Grades are based on attendance, class participation, and presentations made in class.

Tutorials account for 2 ECTS.

Grading System

The French grading system uses a 0 to 20 grading scale. All the grades are assigned out of 20.

The highest possible grade is 20/20, and the lowest possible grade is 0/20. Hence, the average grade is 10/20, which is the minimum grade required to pass.

Depending on the grade a student gets, the following honours are assigned :

- 10 to 12/20 : «mention passable» = pass
- 12 to 14/20 : «mention assez bien» = satisfactory
- 14 to 16/20 : «mention bien» = good
- 16 to 18/20 : «mention très bien» = excellent
- 18 to 20/20 : «félicitations» = excellent with honours

Enrolling in courses

Students needn't formally enrol in the courses they have selected. They only have to attend the courses and sign up for the exam.

Concerning tutorials, international students attend the tutorial in question and inform the lecturer they will be attending his tutorial ; the lecturer will sign them up for the exam.

For each semester, students need to sign up for taking exams both at the «Service de la Sclarité» (for the courses given at the Faculty of Economics), then at the «Bureau des Relations Internationales» (and include courses taken in other faculties of the University of Montpellier).

The form to be filled in is called **Fiche de Notes**.

Administrative Registration

As you arrive at the Faculty of Economics of the University of Montpellier, you will have to confirm your registration at the «Bureau des Inscriptions» (Office of the Registrar).

This procedure is **compulsory**. It will allow us to edit your Transcripts of Records and will allow you to benefit from adequate insurance coverage.

As part of the Erasmus + programme, you will only pay €5,10, and will have to provide the following documents:

- Registration file to be withdrawn in the corresponding service ;
- Copy of your ID (or passport) ;
- Copy of European Health Insurance Credential ;
- Letter of Acceptance (provided by the International Relations Office of the Faculty) ;
- Third-party Insurance ;
- Accepted forms of payment : Credit Card, Cheques, no cash accepted

For students coming from outside the European Union : During the administrative registration you will have to register with one of the compulsory Student Health Insurance provider : MEP or LMDE.

The total cost for the administrative registration of a **non-EU student** is of €215,10 (in 2015-2016).

The University of Montpellier offers students the possibility to practise sports for approximately €40 per year.

Health Insurance coverage

When studying abroad it is essential to be adequately covered in the event you require medical assistance.

Outside of any exchange programme (such as Erasmus+), students are compelled to register with a student health insurance provider (MEP or LMDE), with an annual cost of approximately €215 for all students under the age of 28. This annual contribution is paid with the tuition fees at the Faculty of Economics, and the student health coverage providers will be the link with the «Sécurité Sociale» (French national health coverage system).

The «Sécurité Sociale» covers 70% of medical expenses, and the additional insurance called «mutuelle» will cover the remaining 30%.

Once you have registered with a student health insurance provider you are free to choose your «médecin traitant» (general practitioner), and fill in an information form that you will have to send to your health coverage provider.

A general practitioner visit costs around €23, and €21 will be reimbursed.

Living Expenses

Here is an estimate of the budget a student should have on a monthly basis, provided that the student does not benefit from University Accommodation.

| Expenses | Budget |
|-----------------------------|--------------------|
| Accommodation / Rent | 200 - 400 € |
| Food | 200 € |
| Transportation | 30€ |
| Telephone + Internet | 30 - 40 € |
| Leisure items, travel, etc. | 50 - 200 € |
| Total | 510 - 870 € |

Budgeting for your living and day-to-day expenses will vary according to your needs.

Accommodation

The city of Montpellier is renowned for being one of the main student cities in France, hence it comprises several halls of residence spread through the city, that are managed by the CROUS (Central Accommodation Office managing University Residence Halls).

Finding accommodation in the private sector in Montpellier can be long and complicated, so you should start looking as soon as possible.

Bank Accounts in France

As soon as you have enrolled at the Faculty of Economics, you should be able to open a basic bank account (current account), which usually provides a cheque book, a credit card, and internet banking.

This will allow you to pay your rent, to receive housing benefits (ie. financial help - APL) and the reimbursement of medical expenses from the CPAM (Caisse Primaire d'Assurance Maladie), etc.

Owning a credit card (carte bleue) will allow you to make purchases and withdraw money from ATMs all over the country without paying additional charges to your bank.

Documents to provide to open a French bank account:

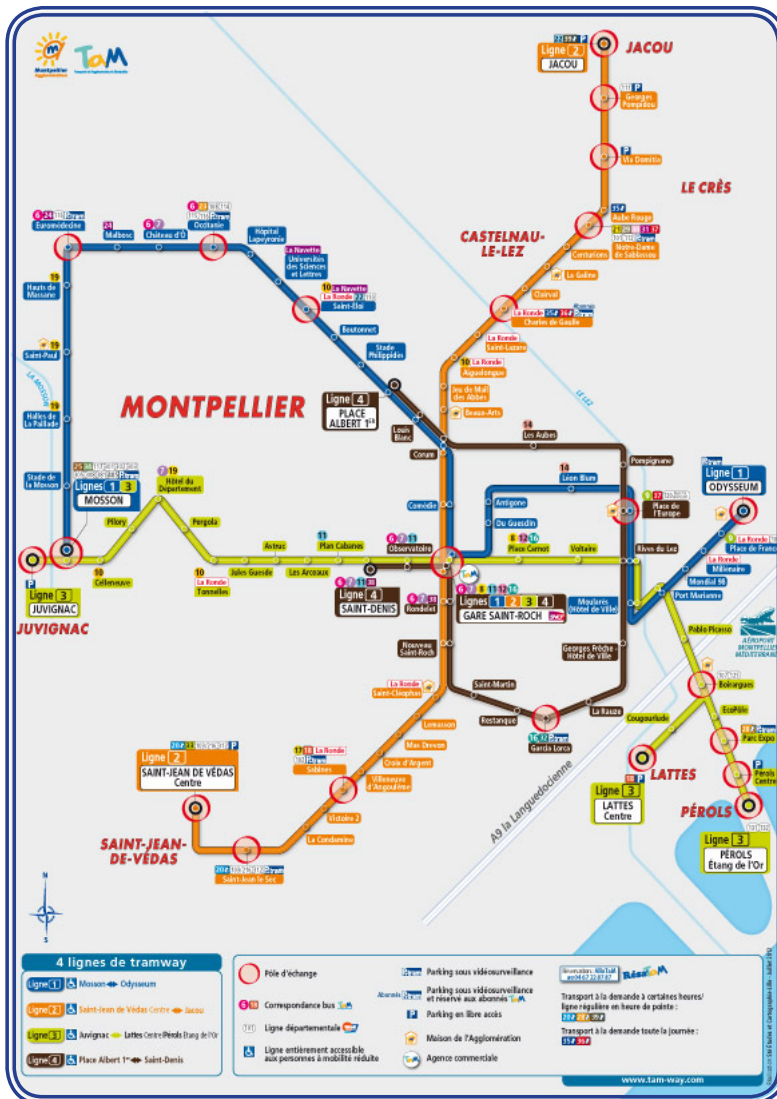
- Proof of identity (passport or European ID) ;
- Proof of residence ;
- Proof of enrollment (certificat de scolarité) or student card.

Most banks offer a «Welcome Package» to new students, which consists of 50€-70€ directly deposited on your new bank account.

Some banks may also provide you with tenant's insurance for your accommodation.

Getting around Montpellier

Montpellier can be easily covered by foot, and is a bike-friendly city with cycling paths that lead to the beach !



Public transportation in Montpellier is handled by TAM (Transports de l'Agglomération de Montpellier).

The map on the left shows the 4 tramway lines you can use to get around the city.

The city of Montpellier

Montpellier is located on the warm and sunny Mediterranean coast. It is both a popular holiday destination and a popular study-abroad destination.



Montpellier is approximately 3,5 hours by high-speed train (TGV) from Paris, and within driving distance of big French cities such as Lyon, Marseilles and Toulouse.

The city is very close to the Mediterranean Sea, which you can easily reach by bus, car or tramway.

Beside the golden beaches, the whole Midi-Pyrénées Languedoc-Roussillon region has a lot to offer: beautiful countryside, vineyards, medieval villages, legendary food and wine, cultural events and a vibrant night-life!

Culture and Events

Living in Montpellier is a fantastic way to experience French culture.

As one of France's fastest growing cities, Montpellier holds countless cultural events that run throughout the year. It would be impossible to list them all here, but here are a couple:



FISE (Festival International des Sports Extrêmes) :

One of the most famous festivals taking place in Montpellier, usually in May near the Faculty of Economics. It gathers thousands of riders from all over the world for a week of skateboarding, rollerblading, BMX or even wakeboarding contests, as well as lots of concerts, gigs and parties taking place around the event.
